It will clear your saved Wi-Fi networks and Bluetooth devices, so what it does is eliminate Wi-Fi and Bluetooth passwords, as well as VPN configurations (except the ones connected to device-originated VPN servicing), but will not affect your personal files, applications, and photos.

These are all erased upon doing a **reset network setting on Samsung**, and make the device start anew as far as connectivity is concerned. How to Manually Reset Network Settings on Samsung?

Here we are going to discuss the **reset samsung Network Settings to fix connection issue**

Tap the Settings on your Samsung phone.

1. Scroll downward, and click on the General Management.
2. Click on Reset.
3. Choose Reset network settings.
4. Agree with your action by touching the Reset settings.

When you have done the **reset network setting on samsung**, your phone will reboot. Bluetooth devices will have to be re-paired, and you will have to re-associate with Wi-Fi networks.

What Will Happen If I Reset My Network Settings on Samsung?

When you restore the Network on a Samsung phone:

1. All the Wi-Fi saved networks and passwords are removed.
2. The Bluetooth pairing is eliminated.
3. Signal settings on mobile are set back to the default.
4. VPN settings are erased.

This is especially useful when changing carriers, when you are in trouble with bad connectivity, or when you have made several network changes and want to start with a clean slate. It is also the ultimate solution and remedy to reset Samsung network settings, affecting only the network problems, but not the actual phone functions.

Will Resetting Network Settings Delete Anything on Samsung?

This is one of the widespread questions; however, no, screen reset in Samsung does not erase your files, apps, or photos. It just erases all stored network preferences and connectivity. In case you are concerned, you could always take a snapshot of your Wi-Fi list or write down some VPN data, and then carry out the reset.

Does Resetting Network Settings on Samsung Delete Anything?

In other words, once again, the fact that Samsung reset network settings does not work does not imply that your data is deleted. In case your problem is not solved with a reset, then there is something deeper (e.g. hardware problem or broken firmware). Then you should consider calling Samsung Support or even complete a factory reset, but that is the last resort, of course.
